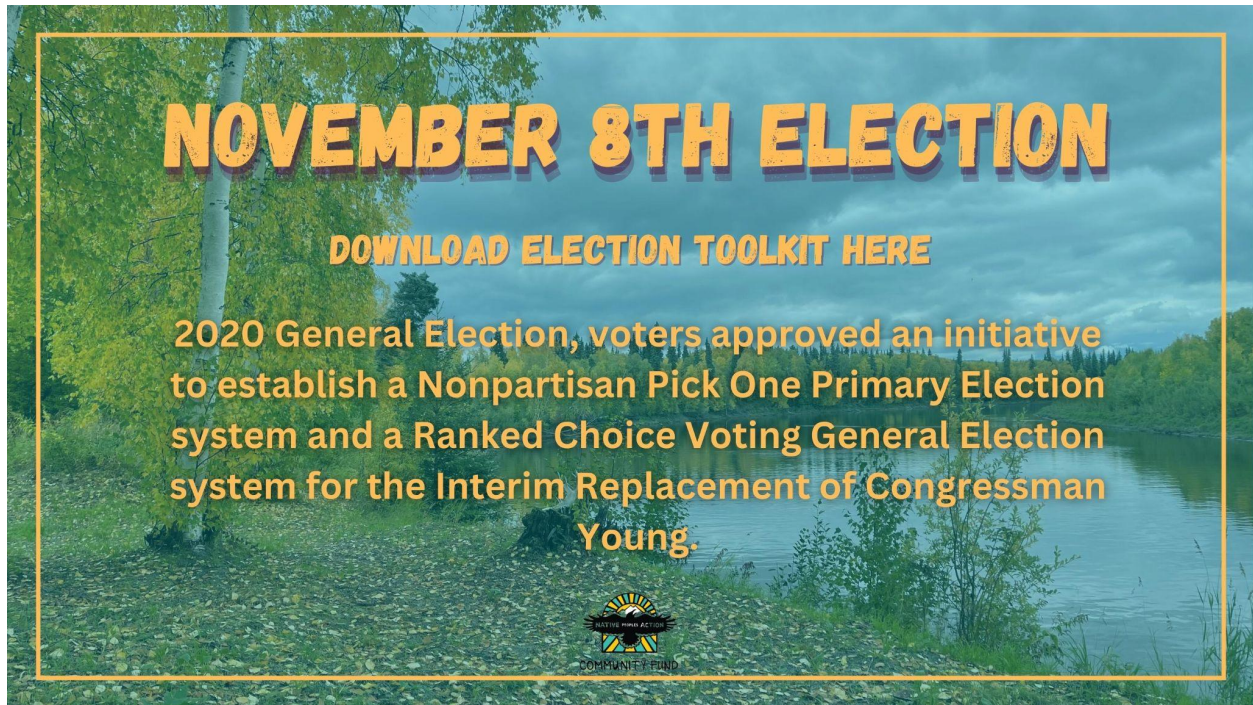

Why is voting important?

Each day, we all work to protect traditional ways of life whether we realize it or not. This work unfolds through the way we care for our children, in the way we bring our families together over meals, in the way we enjoy the changing of seasons, and in the way that we seek to be present for our communities. It is the belief of NPA/CF that our communities hold the knowledge of how to create a world where our lands and waters and people are healthy and safe. It is our responsibility to share this knowledge - All of us must use our voices to uplift our cultures, traditions, and ways of life, and identify and enact better solutions to policies and systems that threaten and harm our ways of life. **This means showing up to vote!** Whether at the voting booth, or through the mail for this Special Election. Imagine how much different life in Alaska could be if we had 100% of our people voting.

“Alaska is and always will be a Native place. Alaska Native people are the continued stewards of these lands and waters. We know what is needed for the lands, water, air and all relatives to be healthy and in balance. Nowadays, stewardship looks a little different, to make sure that we are advocating for our ways of life we need to show up at the polls and vote for candidates whose values best align with our own.” -Rochelle Adams, NPACF Indigenous Engagement Director

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Elections Overview:

The general election continues on, with the next state-wide election occurring on November 8th, 2022. In accordance with Alaska law, all general elections will be conducted by Ranked Choice Voting (RCV). Voters will be able to cast their ballot absentee (by mail or electronically), early in-person, or in person on Election Day.

As you prepare for the November 8th Election, here are a few key things to note:

1. RCV allows voters to rank candidates in order of preference. Only the top four candidates who received the greatest number of votes for any office in the primary will appear on the general election ballot. There will still be a space for write-in candidates. For a candidate to win, they must receive a majority (50% + 1) of total votes cast. If no candidate receives a majority of 1st choice votes in the 1st round of counting, more rounds of counting continue until a candidate reaches a majority.

November 8th Election Timeline:

Voter Registration Deadline: October 09, 2022

Target date to mail english, Alaska Native, and Tagalog OEP to voters: October 10, 2022

Target dates for first mailing of absentee by-mail ballots to civilian voters: October 14, 2022

Statutory deadline for OEPs to be mailed to voters in all languages: October 17, 2022

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Ways to Turn in Your Ballot

Absentee:

- Send early to make sure it's postmarked by November 8th.
- Drop absentee ballots at any Division of Elections office or voting location on or before November 8th
- Deadline to apply to have your absentee ballot mailed to you is October 29th
- Deadline to have your ballot postmarked, emailed or faxed is November 8th
- Early in-Person: Early in-person voting begins October 24

Absentee By-Mail Voting

Apply before October 29, Alaska Standard Time, to receive by-mail ballot

Make sure your ballot is postmarked and in the mail by Election Day, November 8th. You will need to ask the postal worker to postmark to ensure your ballot is counted.

In-Person Election Day: Election day is November 8th

What will the ballot look like?

The candidates for State and National Offices that have advanced to the General Election in November will be included. This will be on the FRONT of the November 8th Ballot, and will have the races for:

1. United States Senator
2. United States Representative
3. Governor/Lieutenant Governor
4. State Senator
5. State Representative
6. [Ballot Measure](#)
7. Judges

Voters will pick one candidate for each race on the front of the ballot. To learn more about who will be running in each pick-one election, check out the Division of Elections Candidate List: <https://www.elections.alaska.gov/candidates/>

- ☐ Make sure you cast your ballot on or before Election Day!
- ☐ Encourage your friends and family to vote

1. Registering to vote:

The deadline to register to vote in the November 8th Election is **October 9th, 2022**. Registering to vote, or updating your voting address, is quick and easy.

How can you register to vote?

There are three ways to register to vote: Online, with a paper form, or in-person.

- a. Register to vote online:

2. What are the different ways to cast a ballot?

Once you have registered to vote, updated your voter registration, or confirmed your voter registration address, it is time to decide HOW you will cast your ballot.

There are three different ways that you can safely and easily cast your voted ballot in the November 8th Election:

1. Apply for an Absentee Ballot (by-mail or electronic/fax) and return your ballot on or before Election Day
2. Vote early at an in-person early voting location
3. Vote in-person on Election Day

How to request and vote with an absentee ballot:

1. Request [your by-mail absentee ballot online](#) or download/complete the [paper form](#)

Ballots are mailed to voters who selected the advance ballot due to living, working or traveling in remote Alaska or who may be traveling overseas ballots are mailed beginning 45 days prior to each Primary and General Election Day.

All other ballots are mailed to voters approximately 25 days prior to each Primary and General Election Day.

Your application for a by-mail ballot must be received 10 days before Election Day, which is **October 29th, 2022.**

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2. Return your application online or by sending your application to the Absentee Office by mail, fax, or email. It must be postmarked on or before Election Day, **November 8th at 5pm AKDT.**

How to cast your absentee ballot:

By-mail absentee ballots will arrive in the mail as a voting packet. Ballots must be postmarked in Anchorage by **November 8th, Election Day. If you are voting from outside of Anchorage, please return your ballot before November 8th!** To return your ballot via the mail:

1. Vote your ballot following the instructions provided
2. Place your ballot inside of the provided secrecy sleeve. Then place that secrecy sleeve into the provided return mailing envelope
3. SIGN THE OUTSIDE OF YOUR BALLOT
4. PROVIDE YOUR VOTER IDENTIFIER (birthday, last 4 digits of your social security number, etc.)
5. HAVE A WITNESS SIGN AND DATE YOUR ENVELOPE
6. Seal your envelope and apply your postage. Place your ballot in the mail before Election Day (November 8th) or have it postmarked by Election Day.

Voters can also request to vote absentee online, by electronic transmission/fax. Applications for electronic voting are open from **October 23rd to November 7th, at 5pm AKDT.** Online applications can be found here: <https://absenteeballotapplication.alaska.gov/>

How to cast an electronic transmission/fax ballot:

1. Log into the online system and vote your ballot
2. Download your voted ballot, and print your ballot

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3. Download and print your Voter Certificate and Identification sheet
4. Sign and date your Voter Certificate and Identification sheet and provide at least one identifier
5. Return your ballot by mail or by fax by **8pm on November 8th, Election Day**

By mail: print your secrecy sleeve and return mailing envelope. Fold your ballot inside the secrecy sleeve, and place it inside of your return envelope with the Voter Certificate and Identification sheet. Make sure all three are included inside the return envelope! And have the envelope postmarked on or before November 8th.

By fax: Follow the instructions provided on how to fax back your ballot. Make sure that you also fax your completed Voter Certificate and Identification Sheet! All three must be received by fax before 8pm on November 8th.

Voting early-in person:

Voters can also vote before Election Day, in person, at an early voting location. **Early in-person voting begins October 24.** Early, in-person voting locations will be open Monday through Friday, and for limited hours on weekends. Hours will depend on location. Special needs voting and language assistance services are available at all in-person polling locations.

Voting in-person on Election Day:

Ranked-Choice Voting:

Alaskans had their first experience with Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) during the August Special Primary Election. We will see RCV on the general election ballot again for all our statewide races that are on the ballot.

What is ranked-choice voting?

Ranked-choice voting is a voting system where a voter ranks the candidates running for office from their first choice (favorite) to their last choice (least favorite). Votes are counted like any other election - each voter has one vote, and 100% of that vote will go toward their first choice candidate.

However, if no candidate secures over 50+1% of the vote during the initial round of counting, a second round of counting will occur. The candidate with the least amount of votes from round 1 will be eliminated, and voters who chose that person will have their vote go towards their second choice candidate instead. This process is repeated until one candidate has won the majority.

Ranked-choice voting may seem like a confusing system, but the truth is that we rank things in our daily lives all of the time!

Example: Let's say I want to make akutaq (Inuit ice cream). I open up my freezer to select what berry I would like to use. My first choice would be salmonberries, because I think they taste the best. However there's a chance that I don't have enough left. In that case, I would also be happy with blueberry akutaq, so I would choose them second. If I was out of salmonberries and blueberries, I would look for Cranberries third, because cranberry Akutaq is also good.

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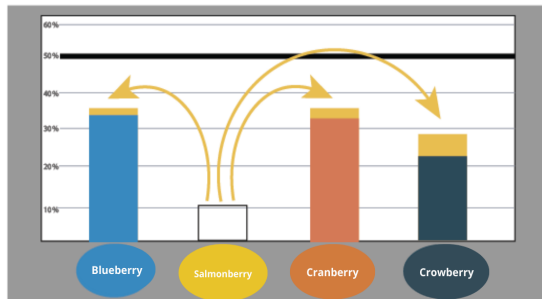
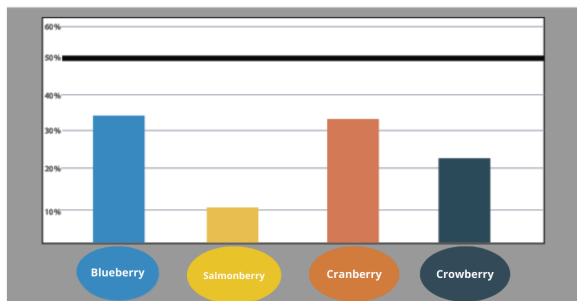


If choosing a berry was a ranked-choice election, here is what my ballot would look like based on my ranking:

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Frequently Asked Questions about Ranked-Choice Voting:

1. Does my vote get split among all of the candidates that I rank?

No! Your vote stays whole (one voter = one vote) during the entire counting process. 100% of a voter's vote will go toward their 1st choice candidate. A person's vote will only be fully transferred (again, one voter = one vote) to their second choice candidate if their first choice candidate is eliminated.

2. If my first-choice candidate gets eliminated, does this mean my vote won't count?

Not at all! By ranking a 2nd, 3rd, and 4th place candidate, voters are ensuring that they still have a vote even if their 1st choice is eliminated. This allows a voters' voice to continue to be heard during all possible rounds of vote counting.

3. What if I only want to vote for one candidate?

Voters are still able to choose only one candidate. However if voters only choose one candidate, and that candidate is eliminated, their vote will end, and they will not have a vote in the following rounds of counting.

4. Will I have to vote more than once?

Voters will only have to vote one time on the August 16th Ballot (front and back). On this ballot, they will rank all of the candidates at once.

5. Does it hurt my first choice candidate to rank 2nd, 3rd, and 4th choice candidates on my ballot?

Not at all! 100% of your vote will go toward your first choice candidate. Your vote will only be redistributed to your second choice candidate if your first choice candidate is eliminated.

*How to Send in Your Ballot
Through Mail & Fax*

You will be faxed a ballot, a Voter Certificate, an Identification sheet, and instructions.

Vote your ballot by filling in the ovals next to your choices.

Sign your Voter Certificate and Identification sheet and provide at least ONE identifier. It is recommended to date your signature.

You may choose to return your ballot by mail or return it by fax:



How to return Ballot

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HOW ARE VOTES COUNTED IN ROUND 1?

Only the vote for your 1st choice candidate is counted.

- If a candidate receives more than 50% of first-choice votes, that candidate wins.
- If no candidate wins in Round 1, the counting goes to Round 2.

HOW ARE VOTES COUNTED IN ROUND 2 AND SUBSEQUENT ROUNDS?

The last place candidate from each race in Round 1 is eliminated and their supporter's 2nd choice selections are allocated to the remaining candidates on the ballot. This vote redistribution process continues until one candidate reaches over 50% of the votes cast. In each round of counting, each voter gets one vote.

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HOW DO I VOTE FOR A WRITE-IN CANDIDATE?

To vote for a candidate whose name is not on the ballot, write the person's name on the "Write-in" line, and fill in an oval to rank your choice.

CAN I STILL VOTE FOR JUST ONE CANDIDATE?

Yes. If you prefer, you can still vote for just your 1st choice candidate. However, ranking other candidates does not harm your 1st choice.

IF I RANK OTHER CANDIDATES, DOES IT AFFECT MY FIRST CHOICE?

No. Only your 1st choice is counted in Round 1. Your 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and other choices will be considered only if your 1st choice candidate does not win.

DO I HAVE TO RANK ALL CANDIDATES IN THE GENERAL ELECTION?

No. You may rank as many or as few candidates as you would like. If you do not want to rank a candidate, leave their column blank. Be sure to NOT assign the same ranking to more than one candidate or assign all rankings to one candidate.

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WHAT IS RANKED CHOICE VOTING?

Ranked Choice Voting allows voters to rank candidates in order of preference. In the 2020 general election, voters approved an Initiative to establish a Ranked Choice Voting general election system.

HOW DOES RANKED CHOICE VOTING WORK?

In each race, voters will rank their choices in order of preference. The top four candidates who advanced from the primary election to appear on the ballot. If voters would like to vote for a write-in candidate, they may do so and include that candidate in the ranking. For a candidate to win, they must receive a majority (50% + 1) of total votes cast. If no candidate receives a majority of votes in the first round of counting, more rounds of counting continue until a candidate reaches a majority.
